CANCELLATION OF MEETING

Unfortunately the Weed Society Meeting scheduled for May 26th, 1977 has had to be cancelled. At this Meeting Bill Haseler, President of the Council of Australian Weed Science Societies, was to have

spoken about the Council and its activities. It is hoped that we can invite Bill back at a more convenient date and learn first hand about the Council as well as some of the work being done by the Allan Fletcher Research Station in Queensland.

SUMMARY OF THE NOXIOUS PLANT CONTROL SYMPOSIUM - MARCH 25th, 1977

The Noxious Plant Control Symposium held at the I.C.I. Theatrette on March 25th was attended by 25 - 30 people. A lively discussion period followed the addresses of the three speakers and only the intervention of the Cleaners prevented further discussion.

Allan Mears, Chairman, Noxious Plants Advisory Commission of N.S.W. led off the symposium and posed the question "What should the criteria for a noxious weed be?". From Allan's remarks it was obvious that conflict occurs between society, individuals and the law on what constitutes a noxious weed. The four main criteria suggested were as follows:

- (1) The need for the plant's control must be shown, i.e., the plant's ability to spread or have noxious properties.
- (2) A means of control for the weed must exist which is economic.
- (3) The intent to act to enforce control of the weed must exist.
- (4) A benefit or gain from control must be shown.

Allan also posed the question "What is the best way to organise noxious plant control - a main centralised body, decentralisation with maximum local government involvement or some system in between?".

Allan described how the N.S.W. system of noxious plant control is set up. In N.S.W. \$3.5 million dollars is spent each year on noxious plant control. Enforcement of the laws rests with the local Councils.

David Sexton, Deputy Chairman, Vermin and Noxious Weeds Destruction Board, Victoria described the Victorian system for handling noxious plants. In Victoria 95 plants are declared noxious for the whole State. The work of the Vermin and Noxious Weed Board is carried out by field staff employed by the Board in 140 districts. Local government is not involved. Control is centralised in the Board in Melbourne, but the local community is involved in the local Boards.

The Keith Turnbull Research Station is an integral part of the system, training Inspectors, supplying information and carrying out research on weed biology, control methods and spray equipment. A biological control research unit has recently been set up there.

The Vermin and Noxious Weed Board is responsible for noxious weed control on Crown Lands and for enforcing noxious weed control on private land. The Board is considering selling chemicals to farmers and carrying out contract work. The Boards budget this year is \$11,000,000 of which two-thirds is spent on noxious plant control.

The new South Australian Pest Plants Act and the function of the Pest Plants Commission was explained by <u>Peter Trumble</u>, Chairman, Pest Plants Commission of South Australia. The enforcement of the Pest Plants Act is carried out by local government. Boards are formed which may comprise one or more Councils, to organise the work.

The State Government, through the Pest Plant Commission, regulates or organises the local Boards. Noxious plants are scheduled into three categories:

- * Primary Pest Plants
- * Agricultural Pest Plants
- * Community Pest Plants
- 1 million dollars is available to the Commission each year.
